We have had another great year for the Canadian Pony Club. The following are highlights from a very busy calendar; further details are included in the individual reports attached to this annual review:


- Effective January 1, 2004 all individual memberships also require equine PSO membership

The only change in Chairs for 2004 occurred in Rally where Jan Jamieson became the new Chair, taking over from Heather Crampton. Comprehensive year end reports prepared by each Discipline Chair follow.

Members of the Canadian Pony Club participated in 4 International Exchanges in 2004. Reports for these exchanges follow. The International Tours for 2004 were:

I was fortunate to be able to be involved in two national events over the year. I attended the National Tetrathlon Championships in Truro, Nova Scotia during the first week of August and acted as the Chief Steward for the event. I was impressed by how a small region like Nova Scotia could host such a National event. A lot of credit must go to Debbie Sloan and Gay Hansen who took the lead in organizing the event. It was as well, a great experience to be involved in the International PPG Tryouts in Calgary during the September long weekend, and to experience the youthful exuberance of all the candidates. Peter Munro and the Alberta South PPG Committee provided a positive experience for all the candidates.

A considerable amount of planning took place throughout 2004 in preparation for the Canadian Pony Club's hosting of the 2005 Inter-Pacific Rally Championships. All of the Inter-Pacific countries consisting of Canada, USA, Australia, New Zealand, Japan, & Hong Kong confirmed that they would be sending teams. Planning committees were organized for the Ontario and Alberta segments of the tour. Riding venues were confirmed. Cedar Peaks Farm will be the site of the Scramble Competition in Ontario and Spruce Meadows will be the site of the Nations Cup Competition in Alberta. Accommodation was arranged with the Toronto Montessori School in Bolton and with Mount Royal College in Calgary. A preliminary itinerary was developed with a program built around offering our International visitors an abridged Canadian experience, showing the difference in culture from East to West. The densely populated and bustling cities of Niagara Falls and Toronto can be contrasted to camping out under the stars on a trail ride into the Clearwater Range of the Rocky Mountains. Inter-Pacific website pages were developed that can be accessed via the Canadian Pony Club website. Solicitation of donors and sponsors to offset the cost of this major undertaking was ongoing. Officials for the competitions were secured. A great deal more planning and fine tuning remains before teams arrive in Canada on June 26, but the main framework was put together in 2004. I would like to thank the many, many people that have already contributed to this planning process.

CPC National Dressage Report 2004

2004 began with a highly successful trip to New Zealand by the two member dressage team of Beth Murray (COR) and Teena Schneider (BCI). Deborah Fox of BCI served as both coach and chaperone. Beth presented a series of slides of their trip at the AGM in the spring and pointed out that over 200 horses attended one of the competitions from within a two hour radius of Auckland. Our team members are happy with their trip and have volunteered to go back at any time.

The long-term effort (three years) in developing drill teams has paid off. United Counties PC drill team was invited by the RCMP to perform at the Sunset Ceremony as part of the festivities leading up to Canada Day. Canadian Pony Club generously donated saddle pads for the entire team and assisted them financially to transport their horses to Ottawa.

Over the year Nova Scotia continued its efforts to develop dressage interest in the region. PEI suffered the loss of Adelle Coffin who had been the main supporter of dressage on the island. New Brunswick is gearing up towards some activity.

SLOV continued to support the development of drill teams regionally and ran the Central Zone Championships. A full report and results are on the national website. The SLOV website has a full report of its Regional Finals.

SLOV would like to thank the overwhelming support from COR and WOR at the site and regrets to inform CPC that Hawkridge Farm, which had been put on the market in the fall, has now been donated to Queen's University. All hopes for an equestrian-oriented buyer have dissipated, although the region will enter into negotiations with the University in the hope of continuing to have access as a non-profit organization.

COR, WOR, Manitoba, Alberta South and BCIN all ran regional clinics. Alberta North had a clinic that was so well received that a second one was held later in the summer for those who missed the first one. Results of Regional Finals of these regions are on their regional websites.

BCIN also ran the Pacific zones in July. Again, a full report is on the national CPC website.

National Show Jumping Report 2004

I had the opportunity to attend Manitoba's Benefit Show this summer and I was very impressed with the way in which they ran their competition. It was very organized and professional and lots of fun.

I would like to be able to attend Zones in one of the other regions this summer, time allowing, as seeing how different regions operate helps me to better address the questions I get throughout the year. Unfortunately the Prairie Zones 2004 had to be canceled due to lack of support. I think we have to once again address the Zones issue. It just does not seem to work in the Prairie Regions.

Canada sent a team to the invitational in South Africa and everyone had a really good time. I have not heard yet if this competition will be offered to our members in 2005.

I would like to thank Manitoba for offering medal divisions at their Championships. ANR has been running medals for 5 years now and we can really see an improvement in the equitation. I would also like to thank COR, who are planning to add the medals to their program for 2005. I feel that the Medals program is very important to Show Jumping in CPC and I would like to encourage all regions to adopt medals into their programs. I am quite happy to discuss the requirements with anyone who is interested.

Only four regions submitted a final application for the program development grant for 2004.

In the fall I had the opportunity to go over our PC Show Jumping Rules with a senior steward and he made some recommendation for changes. I have been working on the rules over the winter. Other than the break away cups rule, it is mostly just tidying up and housekeeping. There are quite a few places where the EC/FEI reference has changed, or the wording needs adjusting. I will have them ready to present at the Disciplines Conference next year. I hope that everyone had a good year in 2004 and that 2005 will see lots of activity taking place in all the regions.

2004 RALLY REPORT

During 2004, 8 regions held rallies that qualified for the National grant. BC Interior North, COR, Saskatchewan, WOR, Manitoba, NS, SLOV and Alberta South each received \$250.00.

Across Canada each Region holds rallies in different formats. Alberta South held their Friends Rally on August 7th, at the Delacour Pony Cub facility, with 44 riders participating.

Manitoba PC held their D Rally at Quarry Ridge on August 21 for 21 riders with renewed interest from volunteers and parents.

COR held two weekend working rallies in the spring of 2004, at Saddlewood for 90 riders.

BC Interior North held their rally over two weekends for 12 participants.

Saskatchewan also had 12 participants at their Sept, two day rally.

SLOV held three working rallies, based on tested levels, for 80 participants.

In 2005, Canada will host IPE. Planning has started and the date for rider applications has closed. We will be selecting a team of 5 riders and 1 alternate to compete for CPC in June and July of 2005.

NATIONAL TETRATHLON REPORT 2004

Ten Pony Club regions had active Tetrathlon programs in 2004. I am pleased to report that member participation in Tetrathlon has increased in the past year. We have some excellent regional Tetrathlon programs and they are attracting an increasing number of participants.

Seven regions applied for National Tetrathlon Grants. Grants of \$107.00 each, were awarded to Nova Scotia, St Lawrence Ottawa Valley, Western Ontario, Saskatchewan, Alberta South, Alberta Central and Alberta North. These grants support education and development of Tetrathlon at the regional level.

Ten of thirteen Pony Club regions had members who were active in Tetrathlon in 2004. These data are summarized in the table below. The overall numbers of Pony Club members in each region who participated in Tetrathlon clinics, training sessions, camps, mini meets, badge workshops and demonstrations are found in column 2. The numbers of participants at Regional and National Tetrathlon Championships are presented in columns 3 and 4.

Participation in Tetrathlon activities increased significantly in 2004 over the previous year. The number of Pony Club members taking part in regional Tetrathlon activities increased by 93% nationally. The number of participants at Regional Tetrathlon Championships increased by 60%. Attendance at the National Championship also increased by 33%.

INTERNATIONAL PPG TEAM TRY-OUTS for 2005:

This year, participating regions were eligible to send up to 2 riders to the selection camp that was held over the September long weekend and hosted by the High Country Pony Club of Alberta South. By the deadline, ten riders had submitted applications to the National Chair. The tryouts were held over two

days. The judges felt that all of the candidates who tried out were extremely well qualified and the task of selecting a team of only five was very difficult.

My thanks to: Del Zelmer, Carole Day and Vivienne Nicol for serving with me on the selection committee. Alberta South was exceptional hosts. Our demonstration of PPG skills at a local rodeo left more than a few rodeo riders and spectators in awe of the skills of PPG riders!

The scoring was done as specified in the RULES FOR PRINCE PHILIP CUP GAMES AND MASTERS GAMES 2003 Handbook. Judges scores were consistent with their scoring throughout the tryouts and the following riders were selected to represent Canada in the IMGE in April hosted by the Australian Pony Club.

This year, there were five applications for the position for coach and four applications for the position of chaperone. A National committee was formed and the difficult task of selecting a coach and chaperone was made. Both successful and unsuccessful applicants were notified by a personal phone call. My sincere thanks to all applicants for keeping the spirit of PPG alive.

INTERNATIONAL TOUR 2005

The 2005 International Games Team will compete against teams from Great Britain, Canada, and Australia. The tour will be held in South Australia. The teams will be required to fly into Adelaide airport arriving on **2nd April** and will depart from the Adelaide airport of **18th April**

The planned tour will include a variety of activities for the teams including visits to pony clubs, abseiling, orienteering, adventure caving, a few days on Kangaroo Island which is a very interesting island with lots of wildlife, a trip to one of our leading thoroughbred stud farms, a visit to Monarto Zoo, time to ride horses and so on.

The actual competition will be held on Saturday 16th April and will be part of the "Gawler Horse Festival". New Zealand International Dressage Exchange

A Canadian team was invited to compete in two international Derby's in New Zealand in January, 2004. The first competition was held in conjunction with the New Zealand Young Riders Dressage Championships and the second with the New Zealand Pony Club Dressage Championships.

The Canadian Team was comprised of Teena Schneider, 15, from Ladysmith B.C., myself Beth Murray, 20 of Burketon, Ontario and Debra Fox, coach/chaperone also from Vancouver Island.

On Friday the 9th our team attended an introductory BBQ to meet the other teams from Australia, Hong Kong, South Africa, New Zealand, USA, Ireland and Great Britain. At this event we also drew the horses that we would be riding the following day. Each rider was to ride two horses through the same test, with each horse being ridden by two riders.

Saturday the 10th began with all of the international derby horses going through a jog up, with everyone passing with flying colours. For the first round the owners rode the horse for 15 minutes and then the international riders could ride the horse for 20 minutes in the designated warm-up ring before having 10 minutes to ride over to the show ring and do their final preparations. Both Teena and myself drew a lovely horse by the name of Teilcey Allrich; I rode him in the first round to a 66.85% , the third highest score of the first round out of sixteen rides. Horses at this event were lent by local members of New Zealand Dressage Federation and ranged in level from ex Grand Prix horses down to horses riding about Training Level. After all rides were complete Canada sat in 5th place overall with myself in 8th position individually. I was thrilled with this outcome and team Canada happily accepted our sashes at the two and a half-hour formal presentation ceremony on Sunday the 11th.

Wednesday the 14th, we traveled with our host family to Taupo; a 5-hour drive in their horse truck. That evening we had another introductory meeting, although the teams had already met at the previous BBQ, the New Zealand and Australian teams had changed for this event. We were told which horses we had been assigned to ride in the regular championship classes for the Friday and Saturday and that we would draw our horses for the Sunday derby on Saturday night. That night we had an international bowling competition, where Canada held their own, until a certain Irish boy intruded on my game.

Thursday morning was spent sight seeing. Due to our restriction of no bungee jumping and no quad riding, the Canadians headed off with the USA coach, Linden Gray, and Irish coach, Tony Ennis, to see the craters of the moon and the Huka Falls. All of the other international riders and coaches went to the Huka Falls on a jet boat and then went bungee jumping. That afternoon we had a chance to ride the horses that we would compete on in the regular classes on Friday and Saturday. I received a lovely grey gelding by the name of Santonlina, or Motley.

On Friday and Saturday I was entered into four tests, two at the New Zealand Novice level and two at the New Zealand Elementary level. Friday and Saturday were almost mirror images of each other. Our first test on both days was the Elementary test in two different rings that were beside the flags of all of the countries and pony club branches. Unfortunately Motley was terrified of the flags and was preoccupied with them through both of the tests. Luckily our second tests were both far away from the flags and we managed a 65%, good for 5th out of 30+ on Friday and a 70.77% on Saturday when we won the class of 35 riders. This score was also the highest score of any international ride throughout both competitions! Both Motley's owner and I were exhilarated with these results, which in my mind made up for the flag incidents. Saturday night we attended another BBQ for the award presentations of Friday and Saturday's classes. There we drew our horses for Sunday's derby. At this event the pony club branches had donated 32 horses so that we all rode two different horses through our respective tests.

The international derby horses were presented to us tacked up on Sunday the 18th, 45 minutes before our test times. We first had to undergo a tack check and then could mount with 30 minutes to go. My second mount was a cute thoroughbred gelding named Westwood By George, I rode to a 62.38%, the second highest mark of that round. At the end of this derby Canada finished in 6th place overall.

All in all this was an amazing trip, from which I have many incredible memories. From the 27 hour travelling times, fantastic and unique scenery, warm and sunny beaches and overwhelmingly friendly and caring people, this trip turned into a marvelous adventure. I hope to return to New Zealand in the future to visit with some friends that I have made and experience the remarkable New Zealand culture again. I would like to thank all of my sponsors who helped to make this trip a once in a lifetime experience.

We went to Thetford forest to go “apeing” which is basically swinging and climbing through trees at least 12 meters off the ground. Fear of heights was definitely conquered on this fun adventure.

From August 13-15th we competed at a Regional and International Tetrathlon Competition at Sussex Farm, Burnham Market. The competition started with shooting, followed by swimming, then riding of a stadium course, and lastly running. Both the men and women’s teams did quite well with Annie DeLeenheer placing second in the shooting and third in the riding. During the competition at Sussex Farms we managed to fit in a tour of Holkham castle, along with a picnic on the beach. We then finished it off with a hog roast and disco. We spent the next few days staying with host families near Woburn. During this time we went shopping in New Market, visited the National Stud horse racing farm, toured the famous Woburn estate and spent a day in London. Our tour of London was unforgettable, riding a double Decker bus seeing all the sites such as Buckingham Palace, Big Ben, Westminster Abby, and so on. While doing all this touring we continued training and on the final night with the host families we had a get together and barbeque.

The following day we headed to Moreton Morrell. For the next five days we stayed at Warwickshire College. Each of us had our own bathroom or as the British call it "looos" in our rooms and there was a cross country course right at the college. We then continued training, went on an adventure tour, and had the opening ceremonies of the next competition. The next competition was from August 20-22nd at the Pony Club Tetrathlon championships and International competition in Moreton Morrell. Once again the competition started with shooting, swimming, followed by riding of a stadium course, and lastly running. The riding went well with some amazing horses once again, but poor Annie's horse slipped in the warm up ring and she had a fall. She wasn't hurt too bad but sadly had to miss the run. Both teams did a little better at this competition and Josh Riker-Fox ended up second overall. The day after the competition we got up at 4:30am and headed to Heathrow airport to fly to Ireland. We then were picked up at the airport by some of the Irish host families. We all traveled to the county of Westmeath. Most of us ended up staying near a little town called Mullingar where we spent time shopping, and touring around. We continued training but in Ireland they shoot air rifles instead of pistols. We had to practice this and got some good tips from the Irish team. The night before the final competition the Irish team had a party for us hosted by the Tracey family. They rented a huge blow up slide and had a big Irish barbeque. The following day we went on a "trek" as the Irish call it, through the mountains. We got to ride all different kinds and sizes of horses galloping through the trails. It was a fun time for everyone. We then spent the afternoon having tea at the Dungin pub in the famous Kinnity castle.

Later we headed to the County of Tipperary which is known for "Tipperary tack". We stayed at Gurteen College, Roscrea Co., which was also right on a cross country course. The final competition was the Tetrathlon Championships from August 27-29th. Once again we started with the shooting this time with rifles, then swimming. Next was the riding portion which was a cross country phase with many huge jumps, combinations, a gate, and slip rail. The course was a Preliminary Eventing Course with over 30 jumps plus many combinations. The horses were once again wonderful and the ride went very well for our team. We finished it off with the run, and the girl's team ended up doing really well finishing third overall. That evening we had another huge barbeque to celebrate the final competition, we exchanged gifts, and had our last night with all the teams. The following day the US team and us went to Bunratty castle, shopping, and had ice cream on the waterfront. We then had Chinese food provided by the McCue's, said our good-byes and headed to the airport. At the airport there were many tears and more sad good-byes from our trip.

It was an absolutely wonderful trip, with endlessly great experiences. The horses were amazing and being able to take part in England and Ireland's Pony Club activities was great. We were also able to meet Joe who's the head of Pony Club and take part in some celebrations of Pony Clubs 75th anniversary. Above all it truly was a "trip of a life time!"

We tested in four regions this year. With the increased cost of flights, accommodation and car rentals, keeping the number of sites to a minimum is essential. We also used the National panels to complete B and B2 regional testing locally. This allowed me to charge the regions for a share of the expenses including the breakfasts and dinners and accommodations for the examiners on the days they tested both national A candidates and regional B/B2 candidates. I might add here that this board approved accepting full responsibility for examiner meals, travel and accommodation, previously regional responsibility, in 2002 without question. Three National Examiners Clinics were held in conjunction with the testings. One of the key decisions at the first clinic, and supported unanimously at the next two clinics, was support to begin preparation of a video bank of tests that can be used by examiners and by future test candidates. This will be started at the RA level and worked down to B level. If it is helpful, we may work to the lower levels as needed.

We all are aware of the need for fiscal restraint throughout CPC, but this year has pointed out to me the need to request increased funding for testing. Preparation of a video bank will help all levels of membership as well as our examiners. Assisting regions with their B/B2 testing by using the National test panel is supporting all levels by leaving these funds within the region, hopefully to be used for educational purposes. I promised new HA and RA certificates, as well as a C2 certificate at the 2002 SAM. It was decided that C2 is a milestone and should be recognized, as well as the A. Teresa Wright and I offered a design contest that winter and received no entries. We will look into this further in 2005.

We have a Testing and Education Conference scheduled for January 21-23, 2005 and topics are requested for discussion.

All the results from each box on the testing worksheets for the HA and RA have been entered in an Excel spreadsheet. The columns are then sorted by mark and the less than 65% marks coloured red so that we can easily see which areas need the most work Regionally. The Education Chair and Test Reps will be given a copy of this Range of Marks sheet.

The HA sheet shows that our candidates did very well in all areas, with marks well over 80% in each of the three Phases.. The only boxes with more than two less than 65% were Bandaging (3) and Effectiveness in Teaching (4).

The RA results show that more work is needed in the Special Movements on the Flat such as Shoulder In, Half Pirouette and Half Pass. Only one candidate out of 7 obtained greater than 65% in the Shoulder In and two in the Half Pass. The RA requires a very high level of riding skill with the Flat requirements being similar to a Level 3 dressage test and the Over Fences to Preliminary eventing.

National Examiner Clinics and HA Changes

We hosted two National Examiner workshops this year. The first, put on by National, was just prior to the A test and Examiners from BCIs and BCIN also attended. Similar workshops were held in conjunction with the other A tests across the country as well. Out of these workshops came, among other things, a proposal to revise the HA test into 4 separate phases, each of which is stand-alone. This proposal went forward to the National Board at the SAM in November where it was accepted.

The second was November 29th where we went over some proposed changes to the B to A worksheets to take to the T&E conference in January. Now that the HA is 4 distinct Phases and since the B has been 2 Phases for some time, hopefully the B2 will be revised so that each of the three phases is stand-alone.

Regional Education/Testing Report – submitted by Mavis Mittelsteadt

Regional Education

The talk on How to Prepare for C2 Testing had an excellent turnout. Lynn Sanderson did the Lecture again this year. 16 attended and their Parents. As always, this was a full evening of learning.

St. John's First Aid class was full again this year. A number of older riders have first aid expiring and are signed up for their Standard Enhanced/St. John Ambulance re teaching and some preparing for their B2 Testing in 2005.

A successful B/B2/A Camp was held at the end of April.

Regional Testing

A Branch Examiner Meeting took place Monday, November 29th, and even with the fear of snow we managed to have a productive meeting. Instead of only inviting the B and up level as was done last year, I opened it to 'all' branch Examiners and made a portion of the meeting a 'working component' so that those who attended received credit as if attending an Examiner Clinic.

We did the usual updating and feedback for the year based on Test Rep and Examiner Feedback, and Candidate Feedback as well. The component that we worked on, with Lynn Sanderson, was done with photo's on what you see and the hardest part is "How you Say it" or even how do you say it 'better', more effectively in order to assist the Candidate, in a positive manner. This went over very well and it was recommended that the Examiners continue to work on projects like this to assist them with completing their testing papers at a practical test in a professional and hopefully little quicker manner.

We briefly highlighted Testing and Education Conference items for discussion.

Thank you to those who have been super in getting their details submitted to us and clarified any queries immediately, if there were any. It helps greatly with what we are trying to achieve and is greatly appreciated.

Co-ordination with National and all Regions will help to keep accurate records for Riders of all levels.

National posted a notice on the website recently reminding everyone Age 7 as of January 1 to test. All ages for testing are as of January 1 of the current year.

2004 Show Jumping Report – submitted by Laurel Glanfield

The British Columbia Lower Mainland Region Show Jumping Championships were held this year at the Maple Ridge Equi-Sport Centre on Saturday September 22, 2005.

There were 36 entries in total, with 9 BCLMR Clubs in attendance.

C/D Testing: We had a very successful testing year with 73 riders passing at the varied tests that were held at the branches and a regional C2 test.

A/B Testing: A Practical Exam: Three ABS candidates attended the A Test held in Cochrane at the end of August. One candidate completed her RA achieving her full A. Two candidates completed various parts of the HA but were unsuccessful with the RA portion of the test. Three other candidates from B.C., ABN and Manitoba also participated in the Cochrane A Test. One candidate completed the RA but did not attempt the HA. One candidate completed the HA but was unsuccessful in the RA. The third candidate completed parts of the HA and was successful with the flat portion of the RA. The Testing Committee is attempting to put forth suggested teaching/coaching strategies, which will better prepare next year's A candidates.

B/B2 Practical Exam: Six B candidates successfully completed the August test held at Alhambra. Two B2 candidates were also successful at the August test. An earlier test held at Millarville in June saw two riders complete the C2 test; two B candidates complete one part each of the B (one was successful in the riding portion and the other completed the horsemastership portion.) One B2 candidate completed the riding portion of the B2 thus finishing the complete B2 test.

EDUCATION: Alberta South hosted a National examiners clinic in August. An ABC Camp was held in July. The A/B Evaluations were completed at the camp and at the David Godson camp in July.

QUIZ: In April High Country Pony Club hosted the Regional Quiz. We had 127 participants. We sent 8 members to National Quiz in Prince George B.C.

RALLY: This year the Delacour Pony Club hosted both a clinic and the D Rally.

PPG: This year has been a very active year for PPG in our region. This year started off with a regional clinic in early June. This clinic prepared participants for the ABS Regional PPG Competition on June 20th. Alberta South hosted the Prairie Zone competition. Four teams from ABS competed. ABS also hosted the tryout camp for the IMGE held the first weekend in September. Five riders will represent the CPC in Australia. Kirsten Riphagen of the High Country Pony Club was selected as one of the IMGE team members.

DRESSAGE: Mini Creek Pony Club hosted two Dressage clinics. Our end of the year Dressage Invitational was held at Claesholm this year with 79 entries.

Eight members challenged the Regional examination with the following members successfully achieving their respective levels: "*B2*" Level - Robby Norris, North Hill Branch; "*B*" Level - Kelsey Dickson, Mars Hill Branch, Kerry Moore, Mars Hill Branch, Petra Deane, North Hill Branch, Kyra Lavallee, North Hill Branch; "*C2*" Level - Hugh Crawley, Mars Hill Branch, Alexia Reske-Naurocki, Mars Hill Branch.

National Testing – Manitoba also had one member, Lindy Norris, of the North Hill Branch successfully challenged her "HA" level in Cochrane, Alberta.

QUIZ – Manitoba Pony Club continues to be is very active in Quiz. All members are encouraged to participate in our Regional Quiz. Members wishing to qualify to attend National Quiz are required to attend either an Eastern or Western Qualifier Quiz, prior to the Regional Quiz. 2004 saw 54 members attend the Regional Quiz held in Portage La Prairie, April 24th, 2004, competing for the honour to represent Manitoba at the National Quiz in Prince George, BC later in the year.

October 8th – 11th, 2004, the "A/B" Team consisting of Lindy Norris, North Hill Branch; Michael Kurylko, North Hill Branch; Amanda Penner, Baldur Branch; Robby Norris, North Hill Branch and the "C" Team consisting of Kelly Krakalovich, North Hill Branch; Kaitlyn Cockerill, Windy Plains Branch; Sara Berry, Baldur Branch and Amie Nichols, Baldur Branch attended the National Quiz in Prince George, BC. The teams were under the care of two wonderful chaperones, Nancy Norris and Debbie Moehring. The A/B Team placed 5th overall and the "C" Team placed 9th overall. Amanda Penner placed 5th place overall in the "A/B" individual category.

EDUCATION - In addition to the regular educational program hosted by the various Branches, the Region hosted a number of educational Clinics and Camps for its members.

An *A/B/C2 Evaluation Clinic* was held May 21st – 24th, 2004 at the Manitoba Horse Council Equestrian Centre under the guidance of Jacky Cooper. Eleven “C1” – “B2” level members developed and reviewed their skills under saddle on the flat, over fences and cross country riding. Participants also reviewed their stable management skills and were introduced to course design. It was very interesting to watch the participants develop their Jumping courses using graph paper and toothpicks and then apply what they learned, in practice the following day.

The Regional *Camp* was held in Treherne, Manitoba July 16th – 23rd, 2004, with 68 members of all levels attending either the two day clinic or the week long camp.

Fourteen members attended the weekend clinic July 16th & 17th. Robyn Whenham, kept all the participants very busy with her intense schedule, leaving some participants wondering what hit them.

After the Clinic was completed, 54 members of all levels converged on Treherne for a week of instruction, under the guidance of Caitlynn Bunkowski, Jennifer Zelmer, and Catherine McCullagh. In addition to the regular riding lessons, swimming, crafts, and stable management lessons were also held. The camp also provided time for families and members to make new friendships that I am sure will last a lifetime.

REGIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS AND BENEFIT SHOW – Every year Manitoba Pony Club hosts a combination Regional Championship for Dressage and Show Jumping, as well as an Open Benefit for Manitoba Horse Council and Pony Club members. The Show assists in raising funds for our educational programs as well as providing our younger members an opportunity to gain exposure to a large show at a reasonable cost. In 2004 Manitoba Pony club had hoped to incorporate the 2004 Prairie Zone Championships into our annual Benefit show, but due to a lack of sufficient confirmed entries from the Prairie Zone, this event was regretfully cancelled.

The Regional Championships and Benefit Show were held August 13th – 15th, at the Manitoba Horse Council Equestrian Centre. A total of 151 entrants took part in classes ranging from Dressage, Walk trot, Equitation, Hunter over fences/under saddle and Show Jumping.

Central Ontario Region 2004 Report

- We had 494 **members** in 28 **branches**. 132 were new members (27%). Approximately 1% were A/B level and 12% were C level with the remainder D and E. Branch membership ranged from 3 to 41 with an average of 17. 7 branches had almost 50% of our members. 10 branches had less than 9 members. 66% of members were 11-16 years of age. We welcomed a new branch: King PC.
- Three **Examiner's Clinics** were held in the spring. 23 branches reported having held 24 D level, 24 D1, 17 D2, 9 C, 5 C1 and 3 C2 tests. Regionally we tested 4 B candidates, 2 B2's, 1 RA and 1 HA.
- **Educational** activities continue to be primarily provided through our local branches. Many branches continue to use the new badge program to support these activities. Regionally, a Driver's Ed clinic was held in April with 72 participants from 10 branches. Additional sessions are being considered for 2005 to provide information on topics that members testing at the higher levels are having trouble with.
- **Quiz** was again held at Sutton District High School with 150 participants from 18 clubs. Branches were allowed to send up to 5 teams at any level such that we had 36 D, 44 D1, 37 D2, 26 C and 7 A/B competitors. 9 clubs submitted projects with Oshawa PC taking first. In October, 3 A/B and 4 C members attended **National Quiz** in BC representing us very well as teams and individuals in their respective competitions. Maya Kenedy of Maple PC finished first at C level and Megan Mattos of Waussnodae PC was third at the A/B level.
- **Working Rally** was again hosted at Saddlewood EC in Bethany with learning and fun for riders and their mounts over two weekends. 21 D2 and up members from 7 branches participated during May and 78 D-D1 members from 12 branches during June. This didn't include Junior Instructors and helpers.
- **Showjumping** qualifiers were hosted by the Ajax, Brooklin and Uxbridge-Scugog P.C.'s with participation from 17 branches ranging from 56 to 69 riders from 17 branches. The year-end final was hosted by Ajax PC at Audley Road Stables with 57 competitors. 12 riders from 8 branches went to the **Zone** Championship hosted by SLOV.
- **Dressage** qualifiers were hosted by Oshawa, Kawartha, TNY & Victoria PC's with total participation of just under 220 riders. The year end finals were hosted by TNY Pony Club. 5 riders from 2 branches attended the **Zone** Championships hosted by SLOV.
- **PPG** regional meets and finals with 122 riders from 13 clubs were held at Durward's Farm near Port Perry. 10 teams at the B level necessitated running timed heats. The Leftover Rif Raf mixed team and the Uxbridge Scugog Hot Tamales A teams and the Uxbridge-Scugog Cowboys and Temiskaming/Durham Rowdies Masters' teams continued on to the **Zone** Championships again hosted at Durward's. The Cowboys Masters team went on to compete at the **National** Masters Championships in ANR finishing 1st.

- **A/B/C Rally** was held in conjunction with **Zone** Rally at Glen Oro over 3 days with participation from 20 riders and 12 grooms. 10 Pre-Training and 3 Training riders competed at our regional competition while 4 Pre-Training and 3 Training riders competed at Zones.
D Rally was held at Glen Oro Farm with 88 riders (33 D, 37 D1, 18 D2) from 19 pony clubs. Unfortunately no **Pony Club Events** were held in 2004.
- **Tetrathlon** swimming, running and shooting was held at various venues around Peterborough, with the riding phase at Killusty with 45 participants from 8 branches. After an invitation was extended by COR, 5 participants also attended from SLOV. A team of 4 juniors and 7 seniors went on to compete at **National Tetrathlon** hosted by Nova Scotia. Zachary McCue and Brittany Emery were chosen to represent Canada at **International Tet** in the UK and Ireland.
- Beth Murray from Central Ontario participated in the invitational **International Dressage Derby** in New Zealand in January, 2004.
- The 6th Annual Central Ontario **Awards Banquet and Dance** was held at a banquet hall in Pickering in October hosted by Durham PC. Year-end and/or recognition awards were presented for disciplines. Our National and International competitors were acknowledged for their outstanding successes. COR Pony Club graduates and 10 Year members were also recognized.
The regional Karen Meuleman Award for the PC member judged to have been the most helpful and involved was presented to Katie Stephenson of Maple PC.

Special Recognition

- Our **Communications** team of Bob & Liz Inglis sent out 37 press releases about our activities to local newspapers, magazines, television stations and a cable companies - a total of 861 individual pieces. In addition our COR BITS online newsletter, CORCOMM emails and our regional web site helped keep our members, their parents and our volunteers informed.
- Bob Inglis was also the tireless chair of our **Rules and Regulations committee**, preparing several COR Rules and Regs drafts before we were able to get our latest revision approved regionally in October, then at the 2004 SAM.
- Many thanks to those dedicated coaches, chaperones and parents who made all these activities and events possible for our members.
The following individuals also fulfilled **National positions for 2004**: Karol Shipley as *National Chair*, Liz Inglis as *National Communications Chair*, Gwen Barnes as *National Testing Chair* and Jan Jamieson as *National Rally Chair*. Karol, Liz, Gwen and Jan are continuing in their positions for 2005 and will be joined by Georgia Gale-Kidd, the new *National Education Chair*.
- We also appreciate the financial grant received from the **Ontario Equestrian Federation** in support of our programs, the large donation of tickets from the **Royal Winter Fair Horse Show** and the great hats and saddle pads supplied by **Apple Saddlery** in Ottawa as prizes for the regional finals and zone championships we hosted.

Looking ahead to 2005, COR expects to be hosting some portion of the Inter-pacific Exchange and having another fun year of equestrian activities for our members.

SLOV Regional Activity Report for 2004

Our membership dropped with the loss of Vaudreuil, Ashton First Field, and Glen Scott, but it's on the rise again. We've added two new branches, Leeds County and Rideau, and Lake of Two Mountains is returning from its hiatus. I have had inquiries from other areas about starting new branches, so who knows what 2005 will bring!

The region was very active this year. We started off with a series of clinics put on by Kingston & Region that were open to all. A contest organized and coordinated by the Youth Reps, Chantal Hortop and Meghan Hewitt, brought out the creative bent in many of our members and parents as they looked for a new Regional logo.

Several branches held Tetrathlon clinics – concentrating on safe shooting, swimming and running even if it wasn't practical to ride. Appleton and Temperance Lake worked together to provide some PPG meets. More Tetrathlon clinics are scheduled for this fall and winter.

Regional Quiz was fun, thanks to Land O'Lakes and all the volunteers who helped with the oral and visual tests and as well as scoring the written tests. St. John's High School in Perth was a great place to hold quiz and relatively central for all the branches. Our Region hosts National Quiz in 2005, so I hope all the volunteers are ready to help out with Regional Quiz in April and then with National Quiz in October 2005.

Apple Saddlery generously donated hats for all our championships. Apple also donated Apple Saddlery bags for the Central Canadian champions. They also provided a venue for United Counties' Consignment Tack Sale in April.

Once the weather warmed up in May, the qualifiers for Regional Show Jumping and Dressage began. Results came into Diana Bayer (Show Jumping Chair) and Kasia (Dressage Chair) as they prepared for the Regional competition in August, and started planning the Central Canadian Championships.

United County members performed a short mini-drill ride in June at the invitation of the RCMP as part of the Sunset Ceremonies. The eight riders are: Katelin and Ellen Everson, Chelsea Magladry, Vicky Thivierge, Kendra Tonkin, Mathea Stevens, Shelby Heinbuch, and Emma Walker. What an honour!

Regional PPG was held on July 1st at Fiddlers Green Stables. Unfortunately, the afternoon scramble competition was rained out, disappointing all the participants. Better safe than sorry, though, as thunderstorms and horses don't mix. Regional Show Jumping and Dressage was graciously hosted by the Nuths at Fiddlers Green in the middle of August. The riders who did well were given the opportunity to compete at the Central Canadians at Hawkrigde at the end of August against other riders from Central and Western Ontario. Bev, Kasia and I worked hard to ensure that Centrals went off without a hitch. We received many emails stating that the members enjoyed this year's competition.

St. Lawrence-Ottawa Valley borrowed the display from National and set it up at SuperEx in Ottawa for the first two days of the fair. Members from United Counties and Oxford Downs put on five riding demonstrations, chatted with fairgoers, and handed out pamphlets to promote Pony Club over the two days. Eleanor Lorden did the commentary.

Kasia organized a raffle to help pay for Central Canadians, and several people in the Region donated fantastic prizes. McPhail Travel donated airfare to Calgary for the 1st prize that included tickets to the Masters at Spruce Meadow and accommodations, Sheila Wark arranged for the 2nd prize, Procema speakers, and Anne-Marie Fowler arranged for the 3rd prize, a 30" flat screen TV. Thank you to all who sold tickets!

2004 ANNUAL REPORT WESTERN ONTARIO REGION

WOR fielded nearly a full slate of officers and Discipline Chairs for 2004. 13 Branches were active during the year and we maintain total liabilities and equity of \$24,916.60 to the date of our AGM, November 20, 2004. Membership experienced a slight increase from 2003 suggesting that our efforts throughout the year to advertise Pony Club both Regionally and at the Branch level may be having a positive effect. e.g. CPC booth at the 4 day CanAm Equine Emporium at the Western Fair Grounds; advertisements in local equine publications; participation in community events (Fall Fairs; Parades). We have been approached by a number of local training facilities interested in offering educational activities to members, a tack and saddlery business wishing to rebate a percentage of sales in exchange for advertising (Brubacher's Harness/Ailsa Craig Saddlery), and both the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair and CanAm Equine Emporium have offered demonstration opportunities for Pony Club riders in the coming year.

All disciplines held Regional competitions –

Quiz – May 1st - 138 competitors in 7 divisions – sent two complete teams (C and A/B) to National Quiz and one member was part of the International C-team. To better prepare competitors for National, games were offered during the marking time and were well received. Quiz continues to be an extremely popular discipline in WOR.

Tetrathlon – June 26th – 37 competitors (increase of 48% from 2003) – 8 went on to Nationals - 5 junior women, 1 junior man, 2 senior women;

PPG – July 9th – 86 competitors (decrease of 5% from 2003) - sent 1 Masters team competed at Zones; 2 WOR members competed on international team this year and 2 others have been chosen for 2005;

Show Jumping/Dressage – July 17th (combined one day event) – 58 entries in 6 divisions in Show Jumping, 66 entries in 7 classes in Dressage as well as Free Style, Pas-de-deux and Quadrille teams. 11 Show Jumping and 11 Dressage competitors went on to Zones and had the largest number of competitors of all the Central Zone regions.

A/B/C- Rally – July 23-25th – hosted by COR in conjunction with their Regional Rally and Central Zone Rally at Glen Oro near Barrie – had 27 riders and 29 grooms some of whom were assigned to COR teams

D-Rally – August 21st – 46 competitors (decrease of 30% from 2003) in 3 divisions, at Caledon Hunt Club

Regional **Education** tried a new format this year. For the first 4 months, Sr. Education workshops were held at the same time and place as the monthly Regional meetings. This allowed branch reps. who were coming to the meeting anyway, to transport their senior members and provided some consistency of topics covered across the Region. It also encouraged our senior members (C and above) to connect with each other which had a positive impact on member retention at this level. Feedback has encouraged us to continue this approach in 2005.

Presenters included current and past members and external clinicians. One session was devoted to a First Aid course so members could obtain their certification for their anticipated testing levels. Also, as usual, various disciplines arranged mini-meets and clinics (both mounted and unmounted) e.g. Tetrathlon, PPG, A/B/C Rally and D Rally.

A total of 4 **Newsletters** were published and distributed electronically which provided a forum for inter-branch communication, educational and informational articles and a classified ad. section.

Testing – Junior: Several in-branch tests resulted in many members (E through C) successfully testing up to D through C1. Two Junior Examiners' clinics were conducted by two senior members (one in the spring and one in the fall), and members are being encouraged to become examiners as soon as they qualify.

Senior: Four regional tests were conducted during the year resulting in 6 successful C2's and 2 B's. We had no A candidates this year.

International CPC participants – Cailin Radcliffe and Dylan McPhail competed on the International PPG team in the U.S.

PSO(OEF) WOR actively participated in an effort to have two strongly youth-oriented candidates (Virginia Buchanan-Smith and Cynthia Cowper) elected to the OEF Board. Although we were not successful this year (the timing was somewhat belated) there may be a more organized effort next year. There is concern that youth organizations, especially Pony Club receive very little consideration from the OEF, especially considering that membership is now mandatory. Although WOR received the largest OEF Sports Grant base funding (\$1980) of the three Central Zone regions, the general feeling was that this is unacceptably low and reflects an attitude which undervalues the importance of a volunteer, equestrian youth organization.

A **Regional Planning Meeting** for WOR's Executive, Officers and Discipline Chairs was held in the fall. Its focus was to address a variety of concerns which have arisen over the past few years, with a view to achieving consensus about the direction in which WOR wishes to go in the future. A wide-ranging discussion informed by the Canadian Pony Club Aims and Objectives and Guidelines re: Starting a Pony Club Branch, yielded some principles which will guide WOR decision-making and actions –

1. Concern for Safety is paramount
2. Education should be a primary emphasis of any Pony Club activity.
3. Ensuring that participants – members and volunteers alike, have fun and feel appreciated.

- ☺ Four members attended the National Quiz in BC: Merrilee Yuill(Oppportunity PC) , Jessica Swinkles (Fairwind PC) , Emily Dexter and Kate Gloade (Colchester PC)
- ☺ Jackie Allen, of Annapolis PC won the CPC Governor General's Award

Education: Opportunity PC hosted a badge weekend open to all PC members and had over 80 juniors and seniors attend this two day event. There were two Examiner's clinics held. A Dressage and a Cross Country clinic for members at the D levels was held in July.

Communications: Along with producing three newsletters for members, volunteers, examiners and Board members, Margie Johnson , Communications rep. also expanded use of the website: results of events were posted, Rules & Regs. were added, newsletters posted, notices, entry forms, Annual Branch Reports, events schedule and the Youth page. The Virtual Trophy case was updated and some branches were brought on line.

Youth: Kate Mattocks held two meetings of the Branch Youth Reps. A Youth page was added to the website. A banner for displaying badges (in Branch colours) was accepted by the Youth reps.

Testing : One member successfully achieved A level and two were successful in achieving B level. B written test was held in May. Two Pretest clinics were held for B levels in July. Two Examiner's Clinics were held. All Branches held at least one testing.

PPG: PPG used to be a very active discipline in NS but for the last 10 to 15 years there has been little done. Jackie Allen, our rep has been very active this summer holding a number of PPG clinics. In July Opportunity PC hosted the first PPG Cup Challenge. The new trophies were added to the website Virtual Trophy case.

Rally: The Region hosted the ABC Rally in conjunction with the Central Nova Horse Trials. The D Rally was hosted by the Annapolis PC in August. A Dressage and a Cross Country clinic for D Level members was held in July at Hobby Horse Farm.

Dressage: Fairwind PC hosted the Dressage is Fun Show in June with approximately 40 entries. In October Avon PC hosted the D Challenge. In this event E/D/D1 members compete as teams and do a dressage test, a pole or cross rails course plus an equitation class.

Tetrathlon: Two Tetrathlon Run/Swim/Shoot clinics plus a camp were hosted by Tantramar PC. Tantramar also hosted the Regional Tetrathlon Championships and organized Tetrathlon as part of the Badge weekend.

Quiz: Over the winter months Eastern Shore hosted a C level Quiz, West Valley held a D/C level and Tantramar held two Novice/D level quiz competitions. We sent a team to the National Quiz in BC .

Meetings: The Regional Board met 5 times over the year ending with the Annual meeting on Nov 27/04. We held one fundraiser, selling tickets through SportNS. Our annual Regional fee was \$35 per member. From this fee \$4 per member went to the organizing committee for National Tetrathlon. The Regional funds supported both the National Tetrathlon team and the National Quiz team, paying the entry fee and the chaperone costs. \$100 each was given to the members attending the International Tetrathlon.

ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT 2004

As always, the National Office has been a very busy place. The job continues to grow and I continue to enjoy working for Canadian Pony Club.

Here is a list of a few of the projects that have occupied my time over the last year:

- Sent out over 950 new member packages. Baldur Pony Club continues to assist in the preparation of these packages.
- Attended the USPC AGM 50th Anniversary celebrations in Philadelphia, where Canadian Pony Club presented the USPC National President with a gift to commemorate the event.
- Updated the Canadian Pony Club entry in The Pony Club Directory from the UK.
- Kept the National Calendar on the web site updated.
- Worked on updating various Canadian Pony Club documents.
- Worked with Apple Saddlery to get the Regional, Zone and National Awards out to the Regions. Apple Saddlery has been exceedingly generous with their support at all levels and I hope that the Regions will see fit to order things from them whenever possible.
- Assisted the South African Exchange team organize their trip.
- Assisted Karen Mutchmor with the Governor General Scholarship applications.
- Set up the AGM, took the minutes and distributed them following the meeting.
- Set up conference calls for Management Committee meetings, took and distributed the minutes.
- Produced the Annual Report.
- Prepared packages for all International Exchange tours.
- Acted as liaison between Canadian Pony Club and the US, Great Britain, Australia, New Zealand, Japan, Hong Kong and South Africa.
- Assisted BCIN with National Quiz.
- Assisted the International Pony Club Mounted Games Team with arrangements for their trip to the US.
- Assisted International Tetrathlon Team with arrangements for their trip to the UK and Ireland.
- Organized and supervised the International Quiz.
- Worked on the Badge program and launched 6 new Zone, National & International badges in the fall.

- Organized the SAM, took minutes and distributed them following the meeting.
- Worked on the International Meeting for 2005, being hosted in Canada with the IPE.
- Assisted Del Zelmer and Jan Jamieson with promoting the Inter Pacific Exchange, which is being held in Canada in 2005.
- Researched hotels for future National Meetings.
- Produced 4 issues of News from National.
- Operated the Supply House, which included filling 368 supply orders, ordering, unpacking and shelving books and other items, keeping an up-to-date inventory and preparing for a complete audit at the end of the year.
- The biggest part of my job is probably communications. I receive anywhere from 20 to 50 e-mails a day. Phone calls are light, averaging about 6 per day, but the 800 number is quite well used. Communication by regular mail is nearly non-existent, except for supply orders.
- I deal with inquiries regarding starting a new branch, where to find a branch, names and numbers of local DC's etc, as well as questions about grants, championships, donations. Part of my job is to direct callers to the best source for the information they need.
- I am available to assist any Discipline Chair, Director or Regional Chair as required.

This year I was able to attend both the PPG Prairie Zone Championships outside of Calgary and the National Quiz in BCIN. Although I did not attend as part of my job, I found the opportunity to meet both kids and volunteers from around the country to be invaluable. It was really nice to put faces to the voices on the phone or names on an e-mail letter.

As I finish up my fifth year as Canadian Pony Club Administrator, I find that I am still enjoying the job very much. It is a varied and interesting position, with the opportunity to meet and talk to a great number of people from across the country. We have an excellent Board, composed of a dedicated group of volunteers who are able to put aside any Regional differences to focus on what is best for all members across the country.

I would like to thank Karol and John for making my job easy and rewarding. Their guidance and assistance has been invaluable. I would also like to thank the Board for their support over the last year.

I would like to close by remembering two dedicated volunteers, who passed away this year and will be sorely missed, by their Branches, their Regions and National. Adelle Coffin from PEI and Karen Mutchmor from ANR were both extremely active Pony Club parents. I had the opportunity to work closely with both of them over the last few years and I will miss them both very much.

Annual Supply Report 2004

Running the Supply House accounts for a large amount of my time. Luckily, Phil has started to assist me with Supplies, freeing me to do other tasks. Between the two of us, we spend approximately 8-10 hours a week on supplies.

The Badge Program continues to be popular, with almost 10,000 badges being sold this year.

I filled 368 orders this year. Approximately 72% of the orders used Visa or Master Card, a significant increase over last year.

The winners of the Every Hundredth Order Promotion were **#100 Lauren Franklin of Blindman Valley P.C.**, **#200 Jolie Dewdney of Maple P.C.** and **#300 Breanna Sweers of Albion P.C.**

I started this promotion in 2001, thinking it was a positive way to promote supply sales. However, since over the past four years, not one person has acknowledged that they got their order free, I will not be offering the program in 2005.

Postage continues to rise at an alarming rate and now includes a fuel surcharge. Minimum postage is now set at \$10.00 and still this does not cover many parcels to the Regions furthest away from Manitoba.

I am still carrying Courses for Horses and have added Anne Kursinski's Riding and Jumping.

Sale of printed materials continues to drop as more and more of these materials are available on our web site, so I have decided to take them out of inventory for 2005. Branches can still special order hard copies of documents but I encourage everyone to download them for free from our web site.

The new Supply House is working out even better than I hoped. Everything is well-organized and tidy, although the rest of the Pony Club clutter in my basement seems to have grown to fill the available space.

Canadian Pony Club Communications Report

1. *Members' Survey*

(a) The report on the finished project was presented to SAM 2003.

(b) At the request of Bill Murray, I prepared an edited version for presentation to the COR AGM. This was turned into a Power Point presentation for the CPC 2004 AGM luncheon and is available to all Regional Chairs. To date, no one has asked for this. It's still available.

2. *British Pony Club 75th Anniversary Book*

In late spring, CPC received a request to contribute text and photos to this project. After discussion with Lis Clegg in Britain, I wrote a history of Pony Club in Canada using the official history written by Zita Barbara May, "Canada's International Equestrians" by the same author and a large scrapbook given by Adele Rockwell to Barbara Grimm. A request for photos was sent to various people in CPC and some responded. My thanks to them. As well, I compiled a list of CPC alumni who have distinguished themselves in the horse world, starting with the Eglinton Branch's "Wall of Fame". If anyone wishes to read these, I would be happy to e-mail a copy.

I should note that CPC Chair, Karol Shipley, supplied a dramatic photo that Ms Clegg felt would typify Canada to those in Britain – a very snowy winter scene with Katie Shipley leading her horse past a huge Canadian flag! Thanks, Karol.

3. *CPC 75th Anniversary*

Work on the British project made me think ahead to our own 75th anniversary, just five years away. Accordingly, I suggested to the Management Committee that we compile an on-line CPC "Wall of Fame" honouring all our distinguished alumni. It would cost very little, but would take quite a bit of time and effort. A proposal outlining how it could be done (remember the Federal Privacy Act – we would need permission from everyone on the list) went to the Board and has been approved. I will make a presentation to the AGM on the project. It has also received oral approval from Sandra Sillcox, Chief FEI Steward for Canada. Sandra is one of our early alumnae, and has been an active PC volunteer for many years, serving in a wide number of positions. She's agreed to be on this Wall of Fame.

I am also a member of the 75th Anniversary Committee and find the range of other ideas produced very exciting.

4. *Adelle Coffin*

We in Pony Club were greatly saddened this fall by the passing of NB/PEI Board member, Adelle Coffin. I volunteered to write a memorial to Adelle for posting on the CPC website. My sincere thanks go to all those who responded to my requests for information and memories of Adelle. You made the article really come alive.

5. *West Nile article*

I updated this article to reflect new information from the Western Provinces.

6. Press Releases

(a) Very few releases were sent out in 2004. In December, a release was sent to the magazines drawing attention to the fact that four of the five recipients of the Canadian Eventing Award scholarships went to current or former Pony Club members.

Over the competitive season, information on national or international events reached us (Bob sometimes writes the releases) too late to meet press deadlines. The one exception was Quiz. It would be more than useful if competition organizers would e-mail entry information and results at the same time as they send them to Crawford. My e-mail address is lizinglis@technalysis.on.ca. This would enable me to get releases out on the day rather than waiting and searching the web site. There will be times when Crawford can't post things right away, and there are times when I can't search the site on a daily basis hoping that something is there. This isn't a new request.

(b) Publicity for Inter Pacific Exchange is already underway. An introductory press release has gone to horse-related magazines and has been distributed to Regional Communications Chairs for distribution to local newspapers.

(c) I have arranged with Susan Jane Anstey of Horse Publications Group to do a PC season recap similar to last year's article in Horse Sport. It is scheduled to appear in the April issue. My thanks to Maisie Durward of Uxbridge Scogog Branch in COR for going beyond the call of duty to ensure that there will be a good photo of the National Championship Masters team for the article.

(d) This year's issue of "The Horse Annual" carries an excellent article comparing Pony Club and 4H. Natalie Henry of Horse Publications Group interviewed Val by telephone for the PC portion. Thanks to Val for a job well done!

7. National Notebook

Over the spring and summer, I had recurrent computer problems, including repeated homepage hijackings. While my antivirus software said I had no viruses, I did have something that prevented me updating my firewall. It took about six weeks to get all the problems resolved. In the meantime, the issue of National Notebook I was working on vanished three times. The backup copy turned out to be corrupted. The result – I have had to start at square one and reconstruct the issue each time. With any luck, it will be out in time for AGM.

8. Message of Congratulations – Michael Winter

Right after the Pan Am Games 2003, I wrote a message of congratulation for the web site recognizing the performance of alumnus (Eglinton and Toronto/North York in COR) Michael Winter. Mike was the top placed Canadian Eventer at the Games, helping to win a silver medal and a ticket for the team to Athens. It should be noted here that Mike was also the top Canadian in Athens. Not bad for a rookie at the International level!

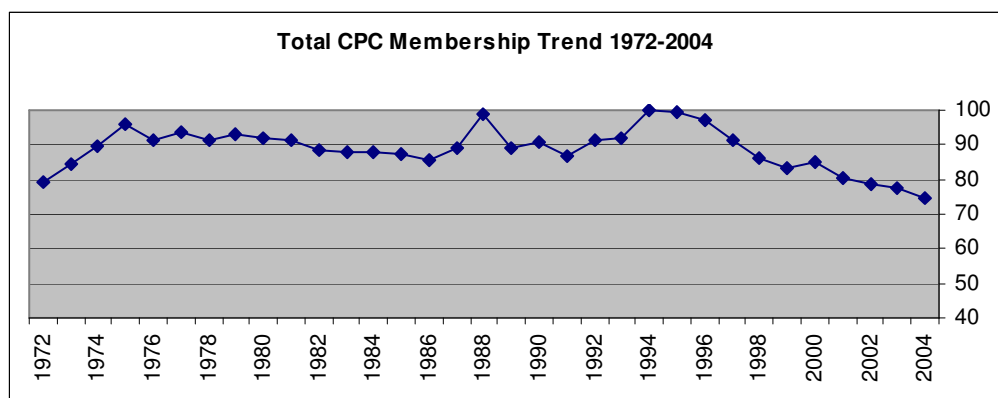

Report on 2004 Membership

The Numbers:

Our 2004 registration was 3087 members which is down by 122 members or 3.8% from the 2003 total. This is the 9th out of the past 10 years in which our membership has dropped and we have now had 4 years in a row in which our membership has hit a new 30 year low. The following chart shows the total CPC membership trend for the last 31 years. Individual regional trends are available but not included in this report. Other than SLOV and NBPEI, there is little change in those trends.



This year, SLOV had a major drop in membership of 130 members. Both SLOV and NBPEI had membership drops of 38% while Nova Scotia, Western Ontario, Saskatchewan, Alberta North, BCIN, and BC Islands had increases. This is the 4th year in a row in which NBPEI membership is down by more than 20%. In 2004, the region had 33 registered members compared to 161 only 4 years ago.

Membership Verification:

In late June, lists of registered members were sent out to all branches with a request to review them, make necessary changes, and to reply either confirming the changes or saying that there were no changes. We got replies from 145 of 174 branches. About 85% of the branches reported some changes and 34 branches reported that there were missing registrations. Between June 25 when the lists were sent out and mid October, 132 additional members were identified, some of whom may have joined in July and August but most of whom were simply not reported, some from as long ago as November, 2003. Alberta Central had 21 members reported missing from the lists, or nearly 25% of their total registration of 94 on June 25th!

Some branches were very reluctant to provide the PSO numbers and in some cases, the only way we got them was directly from the PSO. Although some PSO's had problems processing and confirming our memberships early in the year, there are many indications that the problem with not having the numbers lies with the regions and branches rather than the PSO's. BC in particular had some processing delays and that was used as an excuse by a number of branches for not having numbers in July and August, however some branches in BC such as Salt Spring Island and Nicola Valley had provided numbers for 100% of their members long before June.

There is strong indication that a number of branches were not enforcing PSO membership before being pressed for the numbers. It is impossible to know for sure what the numbers are, but we do know that 54 out of 78 new members in BC who got their HCBC memberships in 2004 did so after the Feb 1 cutoff date and that 7 of the renewals of HCBC memberships did not take place until July or later, one as late as mid September. These are only the ones we tripped over so the total is certainly much larger. Only Saskatchewan, Manitoba, and the 3 Ontario regions provided nearly all of the PSO numbers early in the year.

A repeat verification is planned for 2005.

Registration and Records Procedures:

Only 2 Regions, Alberta Central and New Brunswick/PEI are not using electronic registration as of the end of 2004.

A number of changes have been made for 2005 registrations regarding PSO membership handling. Unfortunately, the procedures in different provinces are not the same and this makes things somewhat confusing, particularly for those regions whose boundaries cross provincial borders. We should try very hard over the next year to find a way to get a more uniform approach with all the PSO's, particularly re making PSO memberships effective when received by the DC.

The requirement for PSO membership and the procedures to try to be sure that all members do follow this rule, particularly when combined with the lack of cooperation by the PSO's in trying to develop uniform procedures has added very considerably to the workload for me and probably for many regions and DC's. The very large majority of the questions and errors in 2004 were PSO membership related and as a result, the amount of time I have spent on membership problems and questions in the past year has more than quadrupled compared to prior years.

Temporary Insurance:

Based on the concept that most branches sign up many new members in Sept and Oct, John Moehring negotiated a temporary insurance for new members.

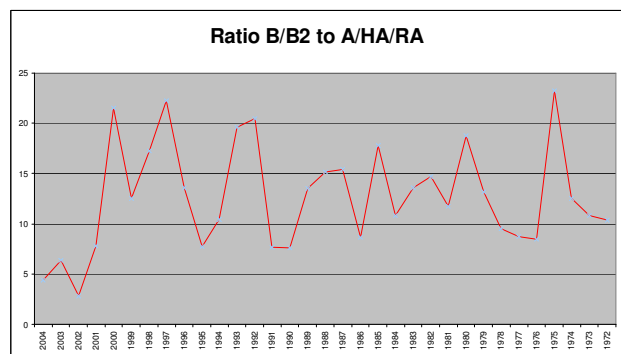
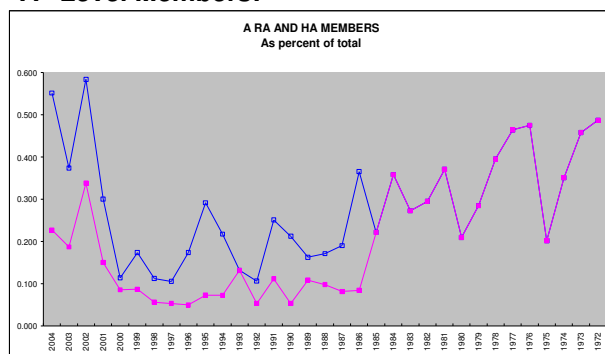
Affiliate Memberships:

In this first year of use, the Affiliate Member categories have been used in 4 regions with a total of 7 Testing Affiliates and 4 Education Affiliates. This seems a rather disappointing number since this year, a total of 85 graduates from 2003 back to 2000 were eligible as Testing Affiliates and only 7 took advantage of the opportunity. In future years, only about 20 graduates will become eligible at a time so we might expect only 1 or 2 new Testing Affiliates per year.

Extended Membership for New Members:

For the past several years, we have offered a membership of up to 16 months for new members joining after Sept 1.

“A” Level Members:



As shown in the charts above, the proportion of full A members and the total of A, RA, and HA members remained at a level similar to the 1972-84 period indicating that the problem we had with very low numbers of A's from 1986 through 2000 seems to have been resolved. However, the drastic reduction in the ratio of B and B2's to A's which occurred at the same time as the increase in A's also continued and indicates that while we are doing better at "promoting" B's, we need to do work on encouraging C's to continue on. Historically, we have nearly 14 B/B2 members for every A/RA/HA member, however for the past 4 years, the average is only 5.3. We need to encourage more C members to progress or the number of A's will decrease again due to the lack of available B's.

Branch Size:

The average size of branches has been steadily dropping except for a couple of unusual years. In the 1970's the average branch size was about 50 members and for the past 7 years, it has been below 20 members with 2004 at only 17.4. In 2004, 41 branches do not even have 10 members.

Small branch sizes not only require more administration and some other associated costs but they also have a direct effect on the membership in several ways.

When branches were larger, there was a good probability that there would be a number of older and/or higher level members in each branch who could work together both for advancement and for enjoyment. With small branch sizes, the likelihood of even 1 or 2 such members is quite small. As a result, those members tend to feel more or less alone and have little incentive to continue in the Pony Club.

In the mid 1970's, there were an average of 1.8 B and up members and 10.1 C-C2 members for every branch. In 2004, we had only 0.5 B members per branch and 3.2 C2 and up. With such low numbers, it becomes difficult or impossible for many branches to create teams of higher level members so not only do those members lack the companionship of their peers but they also miss out on many of the team aspects of Pony Club.

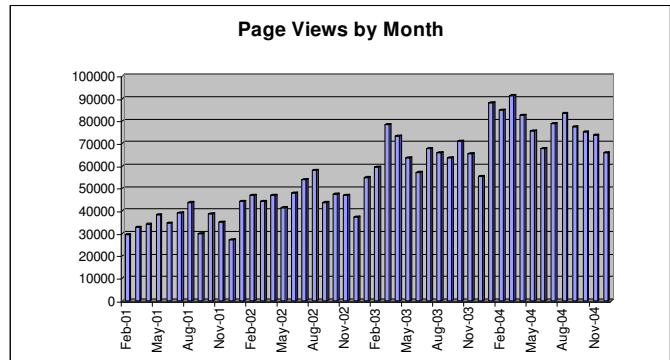
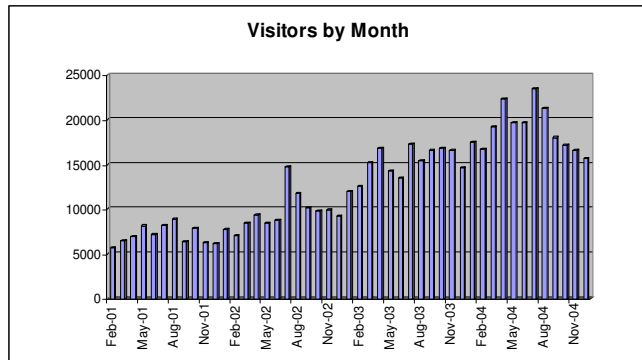
There are many cases in which several branches exist in the same area with membership boundaries overlapping with 2 or 3 other branches and in the long run, this is probably detrimental to the Pony Club.

Perhaps it is time to carefully examine the reasons for small branches and to explore whether small branches that are close to each other (say within 25KM) should combine into larger branches, which have a better chance of operating properly and in a way which is rewarding to the members.

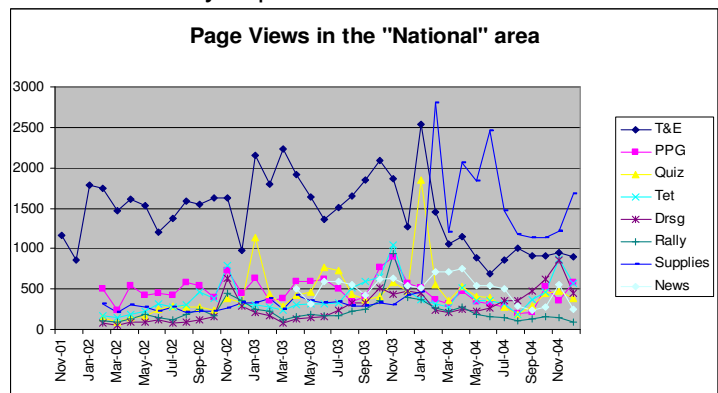
Website Report

Use of the Site: In 2004, we had 227,100 visitors (23,500 in July) who looked at 946,000 pages. We almost reached the 250,000 visitors and 1 million pages viewed milestones in 2004. This is an increase of 38% in visitors and 30% in pages from last year. A chart showing the major areas of interest is at the end of this report.



Page Updating: As I have mentioned for several years, many discipline and T&E pages and some regional pages are seriously out of date. Stale information on the discipline pages or particularly on the T&E pages can misinform members in very important areas.

The chart to the right shows page views in the National area. Discipline pages get viewed a significant number of times every month, although they have peaks at competition time. Until interest in the Supplies pages peaked after introduction of the badges, the most viewed pages were the T&E ones, however interest in those pages has declined to about half of the 2003 level, possibly because they are not up to date.



Regional Initiatives: Recently both BC Lower Mainland and Alberta South have taken on direct responsibility for maintaining their sections of the site. The attached chart shows that in both cases, interest has jumped and I hope that it continues to climb. The BCLM initiative is very interesting since it allows branches or regional reps to keep their own pages up to date. Joerg Beekmann has led the effort in BCLM and provided the following summary:

Phase 1 of the site was completed late August. It has a static general description of the region its branches and activities. The site also includes a "News" section where news and announcements may be shared among all branches. The news section is linked to a "Calendar" page.

Sept saw 4700 page hits and Oct will get about 2500. The historical range was 400 to 2500. Secretaries for both the Dressage and Show Jumping Championships have used the site to post entry forms, relevant regulations, start times and results. The Vancouver branch is posting all club dates. Initial feed back is positive.

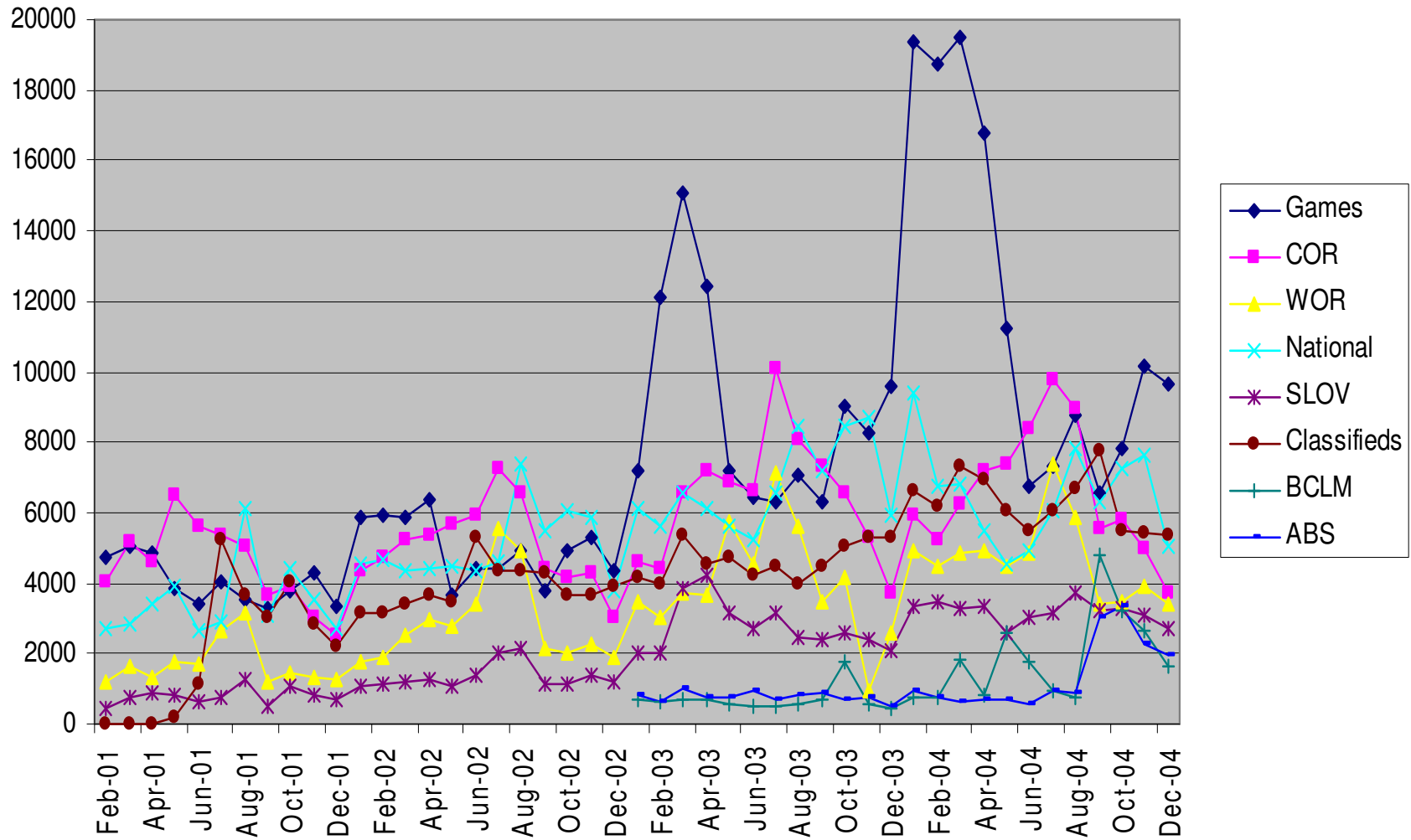
The focus in the next year will be on content and site awareness. One goal is to ensure announcements and results for all events involving more than one club are posted on the site. A second goal is to grow the number of writers and editors, both among parents and members. We will be providing multi-media badges to any member that writes an article for the web site.

Games: The games are still popular, but interest is decreasing. Games were played 142,000 times in the last 12 months and 20,000 times in each of Jan, Feb, and March.

Suggestions have been made for a contest about badges and for a game using photos of objects which are used at Quiz. The badges contest will likely be set up early in 2005, however I cannot set up the quiz objects unless I get photos. If you have any suitable photos, please send them to me with a description of what they are.

IN MEMORIAM - ADELLE COFFIN 1953-2004

With deep sadness Canadian Pony Club announced the death of National Director, Adelle Coffin of New Brunswick/PEI Region. Adelle died June 27 in Charlottetown of lung cancer. In making the announcement, National Chair, Karol Shipley sent Pony Club's condolences to the Coffin family and reminded us all of the wonderful hospitality received during the 2003 National Quiz hosted by the New Brunswick/Prince Edward Island Region, and organized in large part by Adelle.

Adelle Marion Coffin (née Devenne) was born in Halifax, N.S. She was a graduate of St. Mary's University (B.A., B.Ed.) and the University of Toronto (M.Ed.). She held several teaching positions, most recently at the University of P.E.I. Adelle is survived by her loving husband, Kevin; daughters Allison of Halifax, and Emily of Charlottetown; one sister and three brothers, plus several nieces and nephews.

In our smaller Regions, it's common for the most dedicated volunteers to wear more than one hat, often several simultaneously. Adelle was one of these dedicated ones. She served as DC of the Charlottetown Branch, Regional Chair, National Director, and Regional Testing and Education Chair. She chaired six Charlottetown Pony Club Horse Shows, plus the hosting of the 2003 National Quiz. All this while she managed to fulfill her responsibilities and wife and mother, and teach at UPEI.

It's not surprising that her colleagues in NB/PEI described her as full of energy and enthusiasm, a perfectionist with a sense of humour and capacity for laughter. They speak of her determination to ensure that "her" members got the best possible instruction and as many opportunities as could be arranged. Yes, the term "Superwoman" has been used. The adjectives "kind", "strong" and "honest" recur.

Judy Allen, National Director from Nova Scotia, tells of sharing a room with Adelle for National Board meetings, of exchanging ideas, finding common ground, becoming fast friends. Adelle, it seems, was one of the few people who could see the funny side of what us Toronto natives would consider a very frustrating trip on the Toronto Transit Commission (motto: "The Better Way"). On the way to the meeting and under a bit of time pressure, they had to sit for 15 minutes while the driver took an unannounced 15 minute coffee break. This is where the natives start making sarcastic remarks like "The Better Way – yeah, right!" Adelle, however, kept her patience and composure, so that when they arrived at the meeting 15 minutes late, she had a funny story to tell. That's a rare quality. Judy found, also, that she and Adelle could speak their minds and disagree without becoming disagreeable – exactly what Pony Club needs in its volunteers!

All in Pony Club who had the chance to get to know Adelle will miss her. We honour her contributions to the organization, and hopefully, from time to time, will share a joke or a laugh in her memory.

Karen had many interests in life and these reflected her attitude towards others. She served as a member of Youth Justice helping young people to correct their ways. She was a hockey mom long before her daughter became a Pony Club member. Karen raised German Shepherds. She knew much about many things and wasn't afraid to learn things new.

In Pony Club Karen was the D.C. of Sturgeon Valley in Alberta North Region and she served on many Regional committees chairing Rally until her death. She was a stickler for detail and wanted to get things right. She worked hard at that in all she did.

Karen was, at the time of her death Education Chair for Canadian Pony Club. Equal opportunity for all members was something she worked towards. If you wanted something she saw no reason why you could not work to attain it.

Life to Karen was an adventure. Each thing you undertook led to things that would follow and were enhanced by all that you had. She was never exclusive in the company she kept. If you wanted to know about something she would go to great lengths to help you find the answers to your questions. At times her sensitivity overwhelmed me. She saw many sides to every question and to every situation.

During the last year of her life Karen struggled to fight cancer. She continued with her many duties refusing to slow down. She organized our ANR Rally camp last summer and oversaw D and C camps for her branch and other young people. She made sure every child had opportunities to do the things that interested them from Prince Philip Games to Tetrathlon and Show Jumping to Dressage. She seemed an endless powerhouse of energy to all who knew her.

Even in the last month she helped organize testing for various members in our region, she chaperoned the Canadian Quiz team on the International tour in B.C., she examined for the Beaver River branch at Cold Lake and worked bingos for Sturgeon Valley and Garden Valley.

A week later she lay in a hospital bed and died several days later. Garden Valley will honor her memory with an annual educational scholarship given to a Pony Club member in Alberta going forward with their post secondary education. It will first be given in 2005.

It is so hard to believe that my friend is not here. There is not a day goes by that I don't wish to e-mail or give her a quick phone call. I miss our morning breakfasts most of all.

Let us not forget that there are people who give us all that they have and are gone. She leaves a legacy of memories for her family and an ideal to which we can all aspire.
